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What Is Rotary?

Rotary is a service club made up of professional men and women who represent a wide variety of companies and organizations.

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Today, over 32,400 Rotary Clubs flourish in more than 168 countries. The Rotary Club of Indianapolis is one of the older clubs having begun in 1913. With over 375 members, this club is one of the largest worldwide.

All Rotary Clubs are affiliated with Rotary International headquartered in Evanston, Illinois.

The Work of Rotary

Given Rotary's commitment to service, individual clubs and their members, as well as Rotary International, engage in a number of important service projects.

For example, a goal of Rotary International has been the eradication of polio throughout the world. Rotarians from all areas of the globe have donated thousands of hours of volunteer time and over \$650 million to this cause.

The Rotary Club of Indianapolis has been equally committed to serving central Indiana. The Club's members have donated time and funds projects such as:

- *Centennial Project—\$1.5M fundraising for Gleaners Food Bank of Indiana*
- *Riley Children's Hospital - \$1 Million for Family Lounge*
- *A Partnership with the Rotary Club of Eldoret, Kenya and IU/MOI Hospital*
- *A Partnership with the Rotary Club of Savanna La Mar, Jamaica*
- *The adoption of three (3) Indianapolis Public School District elementary schools*
- *The Ruth Lilly Center for Health Education*

In addition, the Rotary Club of Indianapolis has established the Indianapolis Rotary Foundation of, a grant-making public charity. Through contributions from the club's members, the foundation awards grants to local charities and service projects annually.

A Rotary Program

Rotarians are encouraged to attend weekly meetings. Attendance helps members get involved in Rotary. Rotarians unable to attend a meeting at their club may make-up meetings at another Rotary club. Such "make-ups" count toward participation.

In its turn, the club strives to offer informative and interesting meetings. During the mealtime/networking portion of the meeting, a Rotarian provides musical entertainment.

Several things occur during the business meeting portion of the day. The meeting is started with an invocation and the Pledge of Allegiance. Introductions of any visiting Rotarians as well as any visiting guests are made and welcomed to our meeting. Afterwards, the day's speaker is introduced.

The Club features knowledgeable, entertaining and enlightening speakers. Questions from the audience are welcomed and encouraged. The meeting ends by 1:15 pm or earlier.
